# Programs

### SPECIAL EDUCATION

PROGRAM DIRECTOR Davey Hough

CLC is the only program in the area licensed and funded by the state of Wyoming to provide special education, therapy services, and coordination of care For children who were less for families who have a child or children who will benefit from the Early Intervention and Education Program.

Many families of children with special needs were especially hesitant to risk exposure to COVID: a concern that the CLC staff understood entirely. In

order to continue to support these kids and parents, we developed innovative virtual programming and therapies. receptive to online support, we initiated extra safety measures — like plastic shielding — to accommodate in-person interaction. Thanks to these creative approaches, we were able to maintain strong relationships with all of our students, no matter their specific needs.

### **CHILDCARE PROGRAM**

PROGRAM DIRECTOR Nicole Philbin

Safe, reliable childcare is a cornerstone resource in every community. Its ripple effect is undeniably profound. When kids have a safe, nurturing place for care, parents are able to work - a critical piece of our community's resources, economy, and overall stability. Especially during the tumult of the pandemic, safe childcare was a fundamental resource for the frontline workers in the area.

COVID exposed the nationwide weaknesses in how childcare and early education is funded. Those who have long been championing childcare as a critical part of the country's infrastructure were heard more loudly than before, and new voices joined their ranks. As the region's largest childcare provider, we witnessed firsthand how the classroom closures and reduction in hours placed difficult constraints on working families.

A pair of programs that overwhelmingly benefit the most at-risk families in the community, Early Head Start and Head Start were severely impacted by pandemic closures. This meant that not only did those families face new challenges to access affiliated resources, but also that the kids in the program lost precious learning time.

A large percentage of families in these programs are members of our Latino community — a demographic that was disproportionately impacted by COVID because so many are in frontline worker roles. Due to higher rates of exposure and infection in this group of parents, these children lost countless days to required quarantine; on average, they're 30%

behind where they would normally be. Moreover, while around 50% of these families were considered high risk and homeless in 2019, 100% of them met the criteria for this categorization in 2020. In an effort to offset learning loss and deliver ongoing support, CLC is offering summer programming to these families.

Additionally, our staff worked tirelessly to develop and implement virtual learning resources to help minimize the impact of closures on kids' education and development. Though screenbased connection is never as rich or impactful as in-person interaction, we were able to maintain contact and offer support to the families who need it most.

**STEAM** 

Thanks to a grant received two years ago, CLC launched a new STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) program in 2019. For the first year, we enjoyed the leadership of a STEAM Classroom Coordinator. However, this year a half dozen of our teachers picked up the initiative and continued offering the engaging and exciting programming to students. In collaboration with educators from the Jackson Hole Children's

Museum, kids enjoyed projectbased learning that encouraged exploration and discovery. Favorite activities included the construction and examination of robots, catapults and ramps. They created simple programs for the robots, measured the flinging capabilities of catapults, and explored how different ramp systems impact how far a car will zoom!


These project-based investigations encourage children to create their

own hypotheses, figure out how to measure results, and come to their own experiment-informed conclusions. We look forward to continuing to infuse our curriculum with these engaging kinds of activities — not only do children and teachers enjoy them, but they spark a lifelong curiosity and love for learning in even the youngest participants.

## FOOD PROGRAM

It's well-established that a hungry brain simply can't learn like a well-fed one. We all know the feeling — a rumbling, empty stomach, a distracted mind, a short fuse. That's why the CLC prioritizes getting all of our students two well-balanced, highly-nutritious meals each and every day.

Of course, when the pandemic struck, many of our Head Start students lost this daily access to our carefully planned meals. In response, we collaborated with an array of community organizations to not only replace these meals for our students, but also to bring nutritious and safe meals to their whole families. With the help of the Community Foundation, Hole Food Rescue, the Jackson Food Cupboard, the Good Samaritan Mission, and local restaurants including the Fine Dining Group, we were able to deliver nutritious (and delicious!) meals and groceries to families throughout the valley.





## ABOVE AND BEYOND

We also realized that the children who missed our in-house meals missed critical learning time. In collaboration with Teton Literacy Center, we hosted a series of small group activities for families around town. While prioritizing safety, we were able to build meaningful connections and offer extra support and development services to at-risk and overtressed families.

Additionally, our innovative staff developed and distributed at-home activity kits for families to continue learning and exploring together at home. From art projects and stories to fun in the kitchen or outside, these family-friendly activities kept kids engaged and learning even when they couldn't be in the classroom together.



Children's Learning Center is proud to manage **four locations** in three communities in Teton and Sublette Counties.

As our staff and parents can attest, we initiated many new health and safety measures in response to CDC

recommendations and upgraded our air circulation/ purification system at all facilities. In addition to plenty of time and energy implementing protocols to ensure that our spaces and staff were as clean and safe as possible, we were delighted to finish long overdue renovations to our Big Piney location.

Inside, we replaced the carpeting, repainted, resurfaced multiple floors, and replaced out-of-date lockers with more child-friendly cubbies for students to use. Outside, we refurbished a large multi-level play structure to make it safer (and more fun!) for all of our Big Piney students.

As the pandemic recedes, we look forward to continuing to make all of our facilities places that are safe, welcoming, and nurturing to each and every one of our students.

CLC's administration and Board of Directors are committed to keeping tuition levels in the midrange of the local market. And we are proud to offer noteworthy program components such as home-cooked meals, STEAM education, field trips, and more. But each year, CLC experiences a 20 percent gap between actual program costs and what we bring in through government grants and tuition. We fill this gap through robust year-round fundraising from a variety of sources -private foundations, special events, business sponsorships, and Old Bill's Fun Run. One of this year's most successful fundraisers was Champions for Children, an online campaign conducted in partnership with Jackson Hole Children's Museum and Teton Literacy.


## Lety Liera


