Alberto

Alberto is a devoted father of two young kids-Emmelie, age three, and Matthew, age seven.

Alberto's journey with CLC began in 2020 when his world turned upside down. During the pandemic, his daughter Emmelie was born, bringing joy, but also revealing a heartbreaking truth – his wife Elena was battling colon cancer.

In the midst of this turmoil, Alberto learned about CLC through a friend. While caring for his newborn daughter and supporting his ailing wife, CLC's Head Start program provided Matthew with a nurturing environment while Alberto tended to his family's needs. Home visitors from CLC's Early Head Start program worked with Alberto and Elena to monitor Emmelie's development and provide additional support for their family.

Tragically, Elena passed away when Emmelie was just over six months old, leaving Alberto to navigate single parenthood with courage and resilience. CLC has remained a steady support in their lives, preparing Matthew for elementary school and welcoming Emmelie into the Head Start program.

Alberto remains dedicated to providing for his children. CLC's support has allowed him to work as much as possible with peace of mind.

Jack

Five-year-old Jack's journey with CLC began even before his birth. His parents, Ashley and Henry, sought out childcare options while eagerly anticipating his arrival and multiple people recommended CLC.

When he was born in November 2018, Jack was diagnosed with microtia atresia, presenting his parents with the challenge of navigating first-time parenthood along with his hearing loss. CLC quickly became more than just a childcare provider, supporting their young family through early intervention programs.

Starting when he was just two months old, CLC staff members worked with Jack at home. As Jack transitioned to CLC's childcare program at 11 months old, he received one-on-one speech services as part of the typical childcare experience.

One-on-one sessions continued during the pandemic, ensuring Jack received the individualized attention he needed to thrive. During the 2022/2023 school year, Jack was scheduled for microtia atresia repair surgery. Serendipitously, Jack was in the Racoons classroom at Rafter with Miss Angie and Miss Angela. Angie has a prosthetic leg, so she was able to talk to the class leading up to Jack's surgery to explain that he was getting a "robot ear" just like her "robot leg." Jack's mom says "He was never made to feel anything but loved and supported at school or different in a negative way. If anything, Miss Angie lifted him up with the robot analogy. We had the biggest community of love and support you could dream of."

Cash

Cash was born 16 weeks early, weighing just 1 pound 11 ounces. He was immediately rushed to the NICU at the University of Utah. When he was born, Cash was about the size of his dad's palm. He spent four months in the hospital. Cash started working with the team at the Children's Learning Center in Sublette County as soon as he came home from the hospital. He was so sensitive to noise and lights that all services were provided in a quiet, dark room. Today, Cash is six years old and in kindergarten. He is displaying ageappropriate skills and keeps both his teachers and his family on their toes at all times. Cash is a true success story of early intervention and how it sets children up to thrive.



The amazing CLC staff became like a family to us starting with the moment they met Cash and us. We were so scared and they were really a life line for us from the beginning. There was so much support for Cash and for our family throughout the years...Cash needed everything at first. They laughed with us and cried with us. Thanks to CLC, Cash was on track in all developmental areas and went on to kindergarten prepared and successful. When he graduated from CLC, we all cried with happiness.






