After nearly 13 years as the executive director at the helm of Children's Learning Center, Patti Boyd retired at the end of June. Patti brought the importance of early childhood education to the forefront of the community, increased awareness of CLC's services, and grew enrollment by 40 percent. She took CLC's different service areas and skillfully unified them to create a more cohesive program. Patti also championed the importance of early childhood education at the state level, advocating for funding for special education services. We are incredibly grateful for Patti's leadership over the past 13 years, which has stabilized CLC's resources and enabled us to operate as a center of excellence for childcare in our community. Patti's tireless advocacy, infectious enthusiasm, and unrelenting belief in the potential of every child transformed CLC into a place of learning, growth, and joy.

Wraparound

Ninety percent of brain development happens by age five. The experiences children have in the first five years of their lives largely shape their brain development and long-term outcomes. At CLC, we work with families to provide an array of services to support not only the individual development of the child, but also the entire family. Many of the families we serve are facing a variety of challenges, from language barriers to financial stress to developmental delays or disabilities. Our team helps parents and caregivers navigate complex systems to ensure the best care for their children and positive outcomes for their families. From the first developmental screenings to sending kids off to kindergarten, we are committed to providing comprehensive, wraparound care for local families.

The Impact of Early Intervention

For one local family, the impact of these early intervention services has been profound. Firsttime parents Nida and Dionis first noticed their son, Agon, was not meeting some critical developmental milestones when he was about six months old. As first-generation immigrants, they were unfamiliar - culturally and logistically - with how to address their concerns. Through their own research, they found out about CLC, scheduled a developmental assessment, and soon began working with our team of therapists. A key member of this team was Robbi, an occupational therapist who has worked at CLC for nearly 30 years. "Looking for and accessing

resources is not part of the culture where we are both from," Dionis reflects. "Robbi helped us understand what resources were available. walked us through everything, and worked with our Agon a lot that first year. She has changed the trajectory of our son's life." A key milestone for the Ristos was securing a full-time childcare spot for Agon at CLC's Rafter J Center, where he now receives comprehensive services from a special education team housed in the same building as his childcare program. The special education team is only steps away from his classroom and comes in to support classroom teachers when needed.

The level of anxiety we experience as parents on a daily basis has diminished tremendously because of CLC. It's extremely comforting to be able to trust the adults that are taking care of your child. The care Agon receives is innate and genuine; we never even have to ask for that. When we drop him off in the morning, we feel as confident as possible that he is in good hands and is being taken care of. We have immense gratitude for the whole team at CLC.



The Head Start program not only supports the development of children from birth to age 5, but also the wellbeing of their entire family. Parents have the opportunity to participate in fitness classes, receive CPR training, socialize with other parents, and more. Our team also works to connect families to other available resources in the community such as the Jackson Cupboard, Santa Claus Fund, and health care providers. These programs aim to positively influence the wellbeing of children and families in our community.

Guadalupe's Family

Guadalupe is a single mother of three children, Brittany (9), Cain (7), and Eyden (1). She first got involved in the Head Start program when Brittany was 18 months old. Now, her older kids are in elementary school, while Eyden works with a home visitor through the Early Head Start program. One of CLC's home visitors. Hitzia, comes to Guadalupe's home weekly to meet with Eyden. Guadalupe and Eyden also participate in two socialization sessions each month with other families who are part of the Early Head Start program. Guadalupe has been a very active parent, taking CPR classes, participating in the fitness program, and



volunteering her time by serving on the Policy Council, a group of parents who help make decisions about the Head Start program. She has connected with community resources like the Jackson Cupboard and Santa Claus Fund. Guadalupe is one of our greatest parent advocates, often referring other families in the community.

Tuition Assistance

While the importance of early childhood education cannot be denied, the impact of childcare expenses on a family's budget can be significant. 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

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
